What is Law Student Information Literacy?

Top-Level Principles: "A successful legal researcher...

- 1. ...possesses foundational knowledge of the legal system and legal information sources;
- 2. ...gathers information through effective and efficient research strategies;
- 3. ...critically evaluates information;
- 4. ...applies information effectively to resolve a specific issue or need;
- 5. ...distinguishes between ethical and unethical uses of information, and understands the legal issues associated with the discovery, use, or application of information."

Privileges the systematic	Skeptical of generalizations

The Future of Law Student Information Literacy?

Differences in jurisdictional traditions

+

Differences in systems of legal training

Differing informational needs from jurisdiction to jurisdiction

Differing answers for different needs

- Jurisdictional practice needs determine the practitioner's informational needs
- Law Student Information Literacy across the globe must apprehend practice differences across jurisdictions
- Legal research instructors in each jurisdiction must articulate Law Student Information Literacy as their jurisdictional needs require

Conclusion

- Law student information literacy is focused upon foundational legal information; benchmarks for law student information literacy therefore depend upon the foundations of legal training and practice in any jurisdiction.
- While a standards-based approach has been accepted in the US and the UK, this approach may not be suitable for Civil Law, Religious Law, or Customary Legal traditions; only legal research instructors from these jurisdictions can make this determination.
